CUGH Distinguished Leadership Award



Dr. Eric Goosby, MD

UN Special Envoy on Tuberculosis
Director, Center for Implementation Sciences,
UCSF

With over 30 yrs experience, Ambassador Goosby is one of the world's leaders in combating the HIV/AIDS pandemic. He was the founding Director of the Ryan White Care Program which brought HIV/AIDS care to all 50 US states. He was appointed to be the Director of PEPFAR in 2009. Dr. Goosby served as the founding director of the Office of Global Health Diplomacy at the State Dept. He is the founder of the Pangaea Global AIDS Foundation which focuses on creating HIV treatment services in low income settings worldwide.

CUGH-Hall-Sewankambo Mid-Career Award

A 2016 Rosenkranz Global Health Prize winner and 2016 Damon Runyon Clinical Investigator Award Winner, she currently leads the global cancer efforts at Stanford, the nonprofit Global Oncology, and a translational laboratory group. The goal of the Bhatt lab is to understand the interplay between the microbial environment in patients with noncommunicable diseases, especially those with hematological malignancies (leukemia and lymphoma). The laboratory focuses on (1) the use of next generation sequencing to define the microbiome and host immunologic features in patients with hematological diseases and (2) developing custom computational tools for the identification of novel human commensals and pathogens in these immunosuppressed patient populations.

CUGH-Hall-Sewankambo Mid-Career Award



Dr. Jonna Mazet, DVM, MPVM, PhD

Dr. Mazet is active in One Health research programs globally, most notably in relation to disease transmission among wildlife, domestic animals, and people and the ecological drivers of disease emergence. She is the Principal Investigator and Global Director of PREDICT, a novel viral emergence early warning component of the US Agency for International Development's (USAID) Emerging Pandemic Threats Program. Jonna built the premier health response organization for oil spills that assists and advises efforts for communities worldwide. In 2013, she was elected to the National Academy of Medicine in recognition of her successful and innovative approach to emerging environmental and global health threats.

A medical student at the Université de Montréal, Claudel has worked for the WHO on climate change and health. She is the past vice-president of the International Federation of Medical Students' Associations, representing 1.3 million students in over 122 countries. She was the IFMSA Think Global Initiative coordinator, working to develop a network of medical students around the world interested in global health. She currently acts as the spoke-person of Stories for Humanity, a media collective aiming to address contemporary social issues through the lens of participatory democracy and storytelling. She is the chair of a Congress that will welcome 1,200 medical students to Montreal in 2018. Claudel is also a speaker for Amnesty International.

CUGH-Wasserheit Young Leader Award

Makerere University, Uganda

Kizito won the distinguished student's award as the most outstanding undergraduate medical student at Makerere University College of the Health Sciences (MakCHS) 2009/2010. He was awarded a scholarship for undergraduate students to Yale University USA in 2011 for outstanding academic performance. He recently won a NIH/FIC Global Health Equity Scholars fellowship grant. He co-founded Makerere University Medical Students Association-Health Outreach Project (MUMSA-HOP) and their Campus-to-Campus Initiative (CCI). He co-founded Students for Equity in Health Care (SEHC) that advocated for free Hepatitis-B vaccinations for medical students, blood donation schemes and breast cancer screening at MakCHS. He is currently working to identify barriers to diagnose TB in children in Kampala.
